### A Rainy Thursday Creates Wet Conditions for Rope Burn



Sing was supposed to be on Thursday afternoon, but total washout conditions on that day delayed the traditional Color War highlights, which include the Apache Relay and associated Rope Burn, to Friday.

The Apache Relay is a race that includes almost fifty elements—some athletic, some silly—intended to bring each team together and include every camper to reach the ultimate goal: completing every element correctly faster

than the other team, and then starting a campfire to burn a rope placed above it. year's relay had campers running back and forth to almost every corner of campgrounds, kicking goals, running bases, climbing a rock wall, blowing up a balloon, saying the alphabet backwards on the P.A. system, getting a bucket of water dumped on you, eating pretzels, shooting a bullseye, and so many other fun activities. At each location, campers had to run and pass the baton to the next participant.
